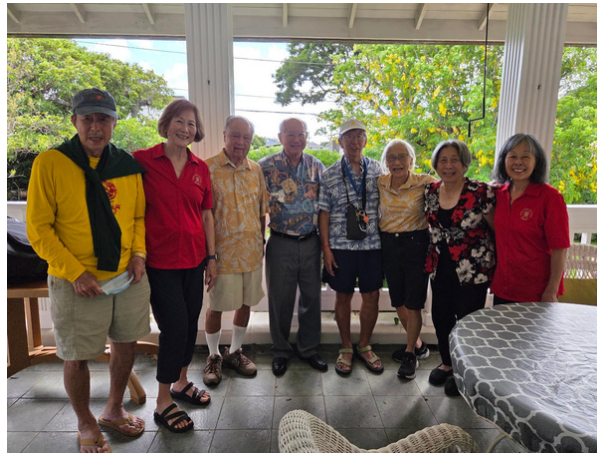

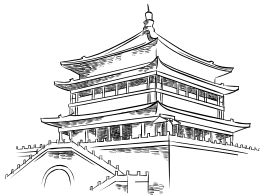


2026 WKHT Qing Ming Festival



The Qing Ming Festival, also known as the “Chinese Memorial Day,” is an ancient Chinese tradition that celebrates and honors the quiet dedication and perseverance of the Wong Family ancestors. It is a form of filial piety that originated in China more than 2,500 years ago. While the 15th day after the Spring Equinox traditionally marks the start of the festival, Chinese worldwide now continue the practice throughout the entire month of April.

As we are about to celebrate the 125th anniversary of WKHT next year, the following poem from our founders is engraved into the Legacy Monument as a reminder of our longevity and success:



“Every day forget not your parents’ words,
Every morn and eve you must offer
Incense to the altar of your ancestors,
Hear my words, the gods will bless my sons
With propagation and prosperity.”



On April 25, WKHT President Stephen Wong and President-elect Kim Wong Balisacan led the WKHT membership in celebrating Qing Ming at the WKHT Legacy Monument in Manoa Valley Chinese Cemetery. In addition, Chad Wong and Mitchell Wong also helped by invoking incantations to bring forth the spirits of our founders and ancestors to join in the celebration. Food and wine were presented at the altar, and paper money was burned as an additional offering to our spiritual guests. To chase away evil spirits, firecrackers were lit before and after the ceremony. Everyone was given an opportunity to present incense at the Legacy Monument, accompanied by the traditional three-bow salute. After the ceremony, all participants headed to our clubhouse to enjoy a large bento box lunch filled with delicious Chinese specialties, including noodles, roast pork, long beans, char siu bao, Jai, and egg tarts. Finally, a grateful mahalo should be given to Sherman Wong for chairing the committee and coordinating this year's Qing Ming Festival.

My Journey to the D-Day Celebration in Normandy



The Voices of Aloha choir, of which I am a proud member, had the honor of representing the United States and Hawai'i at the 2026 D-Day commemorative ceremonies in Normandy, France. The events marked the 82nd anniversary of D-Day, when U.S. and Allied forces launched one of the largest amphibious invasions in history. On June 6, 1944, approximately 4,441 Allied soldiers, including 2,501 Americans, lost their lives during the invasion.

On June 5, 2026, the sea was calm. Only the beach grass swayed gently in the breeze. A few beachcombers wandered across the wide, quiet expanse of Utah Beach, perhaps unaware of the tremendous sacrifice that had taken place there 82 years earlier.

Thirty of our choir's 60 members made the journey to France, many visiting for the first time. Our theme throughout the trip was peace.

Our first performance took place on June 5 during the solemn Liberation Memorial Ceremony at Utah Beach. We opened the ceremony by singing *Prayer for Shalom and The Mansions of the Lord*. As a symbol of friendship and shared sacrifice, both the French and U.S. national anthems were performed. The French mayor and a U.S. representative offered remarks before laying a wreath at the Utah Beach Memorial. The ceremony concluded with the combined massed bands and choir performing John Williams' *Hymn to the Fallen*.

For most of our performances, our choir proudly wore Hawaiian-style kihei to represent our island home and cultural heritage.

On June 6, the anniversary of D-Day, we performed at the Concert de Libération in the town square of Sainte-Mère-Eglise, the first French town liberated by American airborne forces during the Normandy invasion. U.S. Secretary of Defense Pete Hegseth also visited the town and delivered a commemorative address.

Later that day, we sang inside the historic church where American paratrooper John Steele became famously caught on the church steeple during the airborne assault. He remained suspended there for nearly two hours, pretending to be dead before being captured by German forces. A replica of Steele and his parachute hangs from the church steeple as a lasting reminder of that extraordinary moment.

We then proudly marched in the D-Day Memorial Parade through the streets of Sainte-Mère-Eglise, wearing our kihei and waving ti leaves to the cheering crowds. Leading our group were members carrying portraits of five Hawai'i keiki o ka 'aina who gave their lives during World War II. The streets were lined with spectators. Many gratefully accepted the ti leaves we offered, waving them enthusiastically in return—a heartfelt exchange of aloha across cultures.

Our final performance took place at the magnificent La Madeleine Church in Paris. The grand domed sanctuary offered extraordinary acoustics, allowing our voices to resonate beautifully throughout the historic church. It was a fitting conclusion to an unforgettable musical journey.

Between performances, we explored World War II museums, walked among the massive concrete bunkers and bomb-scarred cliffs at Pointe du Hoc, visited the Normandy American Cemetery where we laid leis in honor of fallen soldiers from Hawai'i, climbed the steep streets to the Abbey of Mont-Saint-Michel, and enjoyed the wonderful cuisine of France.

This journey was far more than a concert tour. It was an opportunity to honor those who sacrificed for freedom, to share Hawai'i's message of peace through music, and to build lasting friendships across nations. It is a trip that will remain in my heart forever.

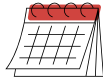
